



RELEASE REPORT

Proposition 66 removes several crimes from the “serious felony” strike list. Because it’s retroactive to 1994, thousands of inmates with long histories of serious and violent crime will have their sentences dramatically reduced and be back on the street. Here’s just one example.

Name: Dean Bandarras-Ross

Criminal history: A long history of sexual violence beginning in 1961, when he killed his girlfriend after stabbing her 27 times, then attempted sexual intercourse with her corpse. Sentenced to life in prison, released in 1977. In 1988, held a married couple at gunpoint, sexually assaulted the wife while forcing her bound husband to watch. Later drove to a friend’s house and kept shooting the friend and another male until he ran out of bullets. Convicted in 1990 of sexual battery, forcible oral copulation, assault with a firearm, attempted murder, burglary, auto theft, residential robbery, grand theft, false imprisonment and kidnapping. Sentenced to 30 years, paroled after serving 14 years. Arrested in 2004 for giving false or misleading information while registering as a sex offender.

Proposition 66 release date: Case is currently pending. If convicted, Mr. Bandarras-Ross would be sentenced to 25-years-to-life. However, under Proposition 66, his sentence could be no more than five years, of which he would be required to serve only half.
