



RELEASE REPORT

Proposition 66 removes several crimes from the “serious felony” strike list. Because it’s retroactive to 1994, thousands of inmates with long histories of serious and violent crime will have their sentences dramatically reduced and be back on the street. Here’s just one example.

Name: John Andrew Juarez

Criminal history: Criminal history began at 16 and includes five felony convictions, 11 misdemeanors and five parole violations. Convicted of forcibly raping two minor girls in 1977. Forced one to orally copulate him before raping her, then threatened to kill them if they told. Convicted in 1987 of rape after assaulting his wife’s best friend — took her to a deserted area, dragged her to the edge of a cliff, strangled and beat her, forced her to orally copulate and masturbate him, raped her and threatened to throw her over the cliff. Currently serving 25-years-to-life after violating parole and failing to register as a sex offender, saying he “just forgot to.”

Proposition 66 release date: Under Proposition 66, Mr. Juarez’ sentence would be reduced to a maximum of four years. Because of time served and “good time” credits, he would be eligible for immediate release.
