



RELEASE REPORT

Proposition 66 removes several crimes from the “serious felony” strike list. Because it’s retroactive to 1994, thousands of inmates with long histories of serious and violent crime will have their sentences dramatically reduced and be back on the street. Here’s just one example.

Name: Robert Pico

Criminal history: 66 proponents list Mr. Pico on their website as an example of a person unjustly imprisoned for a petty drug offense. But his record goes back to 1965 and includes convictions for prowling, resisting arrest, robbery, conspiracy, drug sales, luring a victim to a hotel room and robbing him at knifepoint, possession of a firearm, drunk driving, vehicular manslaughter and possession of a concealed weapon. In 1987, participated in an armed home invasion in which the husband was beaten and the wife assaulted. Sentenced to 7 years in prison, paroled, violated parole. Convicted of transporting heroin in 1993, later convicted of commercial burglary. Now serving 25 years to life for heroin possession.

Proposition 66 release date: Under Proposition 66, Mr. Pico’s sentence would be reduced to a maximum of three years. Because of time served and “good time” credits, he would be eligible for immediate release.
