



RELEASE REPORT

Proposition 66 removes several crimes from the “serious felony” strike list. Because it’s retroactive to 1994, thousands of inmates with long histories of serious and violent crime will have their sentences dramatically reduced and be back on the street. Here’s just one example.

Name: Daniel Ozuna Smith

Criminal history: Criminal history began at 19. Convicted of robbery in 1961. Violated parole three times in 1979 and once in 1980 when he forced two 15-year-old males into his car, then sodomized one at knife-point. Convicted of kidnapping in 1980, served one year in jail. In 1981, convicted of raping a pregnant woman at gunpoint, sentenced to 12 years. Two parole violations in 1989, one parole violation in 1990. Convicted of possession of drugs for sale in 1991, sentenced to five years. Released on parole in 1994, arrested within four months for heroin possession. Now serving 25 years to life.

Proposition 66 release date: Under Proposition 66, Mr. Smith’s sentence would be reduced to a maximum of six years. Because of time served and “good time” credits, would be eligible for immediate release.
